Allen Verne, M.D. was born in New York City and received his medical degree from New York Medical College. He completed his ophthalmology training at St. Luke's Hospital Center in New York City and his retina training at Pacific Medical Center in San Francisco. Dr. Verne served as the Chief of Ophthalmology at L.B.J. Tropical Medical Center in Pago Pago American Samoa. He is the former head of the retina service at Highland Hospital and has been Chief of Ophthalmology at John Muir Hospital. Dr. Verne is a founder and past president of the Vitreous Society, now known as the American Society of Retina Specialists (ASRS).



Craig Leong, M.D. grew up in central California where his father practiced family medicine. He received his undergraduate degree from Stanford University and attended Northwestern University Medical School in Chicago. 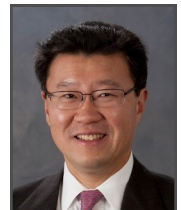
